Chicks are in high demand, so ordering early is very important! We only order based on orders we receive, so reserve your chicks now! Chicks are ordered as pullets. **Mistakes in sexing are beyond our control.** They must be ordered a minimum of **one week** before desired pickup date, and the minimum order is **6 chicks per pickup date**. All poultry must be paid for at time of order and picked up on the day of arrival.

**** Due to shipping challenges, chicks may arrive the day before or after expected pickup date.****

Chickens:

Black Australorp: Tight feathered and heavysset birds. They are solid black, with an iridescent green sheen. Excellent dual-purpose birds as they are large when mature and great layers. Tend to have docile, yet curious dispositions. Hens weigh around 8 pounds.

Buff Orpington: Very large, fluffy, and heavysset solid yellow birds. They are moderately good layers (200 - 280 eggs per year), but are excellent pets as they enjoy being around people. Slow to mature, and can be bullied by more dominant birds. Hens weigh around 8 pounds.

Easter Egger: Extremely docile, family friendly birds. They are both heat and cold hearty. Hens weigh around 5 pounds and grow to be a variety of colors. They lay large colorful eggs that range from olive green to turquoise blue and occasionally rose or brown. They are similar to Ameraucanas.

Delaware: Average, white and black birds who reach around 6 pounds. They are very calm and don't usually startle. Average between 200 - 280 eggs per year.

Gold Sex Link: Medium sized birds who are heavy layers - 300+ light brown eggs per year when mature! Hens weigh around 7 pounds and are white, light yellow, and gold. Excellent cold-hardiness.

Olive Egger: Dual purpose birds that lay a deep green colored egg. They lay around 150-200 large eggs a year. These active and docile birds are cold and heat hardy. They are rarely broody.

Rhode Island Red: Heavier birds who are also dual-purpose. Excellent layers of large, light to medium brown colored eggs. They are a dark red, and have some black feathering in their tails. Hens weigh around 7 pounds.

Speckled Sussex: Heavy, dual-purpose birds who are also very cold hardy. Good layers of large, light brown and tinted eggs. Their plumage is distinct as they have a dark mahogany base with individual feathers ending in a black bar and white tip. These birds also make excellent show poultry due to their intelligent and mellow demeanor.

Wyandotte: Gold or Silver Laced; Dual purpose birds weighing 6-9lbs. They lay brown eggs, 220-280 per year. Docile and friendly. They are cold hardy, and not broody.

White Leghorn: These snow white birds lay an average of 280 - 300 eggs per year. Unlike the other mentioned breeds, they lay large/extra large white eggs. They are very athletic birds, so they're non sitters. They're usually flighty/nervous in behavior.

Turkeys:

Broad Breasted (BB) White: Very large turkeys bred for meat production. These are your typical grocery store variety turkey, and can reach 50 pounds at full maturity. Their white feathers leave no pin marks when the birds are dressed.

Broad Breasted (BB) Bronze: Large turkeys bred for meat production. They are known for their coppery-bronze coloration, and can reach between 30 - 50 pounds at maturity.
